This prestigious award recognises NSW Public Schools that have successfully created a sustainable learning environment through a project. Only 12 schools across the entire state were recognised in this category. The schools awarded demonstrated that a significant improvement in learning outcomes resulted from the project being instigated. Muirfield High School's project was titled Inspiring Success: Building a Collaborative Professional Learning Culture. The project saw significant improvements in HSC and NAPLAN results as a result of teacher professional learning. Congratulations to all the staff on making a difference to students.



### HSC Trials

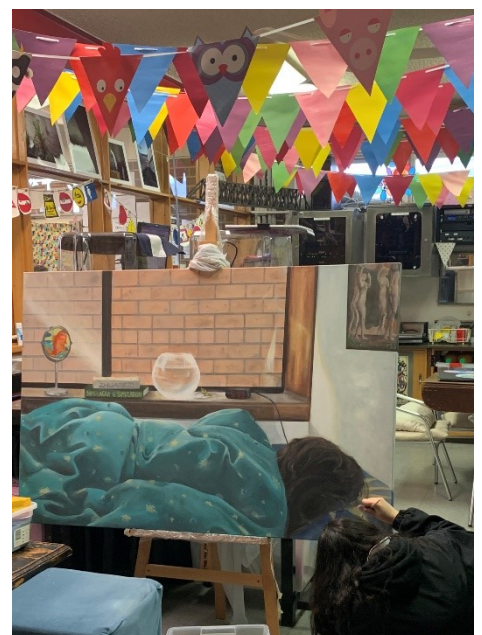

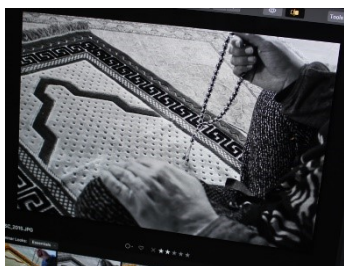
As we move ever so close to the Year 12 HSC Examinations in Term 4, I would like to take this opportunity to wish our Year 12 cohort the very best for their study preparations, and hope that they enjoy the final few special weeks of their schooling in a safe, responsible and sensible manner.

### HSC Major Works

Term 3 is always extremely busy but especially so for Year 12 students who have a Major Work component to their pattern of study. Students in these courses have been busy putting the final touches on their efforts before submitting them to NESAs. Muirfield offers a very broad curriculum and in this our students have had the opportunity to select from a number of subjects that include a major work.

Industrial Technology Timber students have placed their last coat of varnish on their jobs while the Industrial Technology Media students have ensured their multimedia projects are completed. The Visual Arts students have put a lot of energy into creating pieces that expresses their views, opinions, beliefs and feeling through different mediums. Our Dance students have been ensuring that their dance compositions are refined. Music students have also been working hard on their core





performance whilst our English Extension 2 and Society and Culture students have completed major projects which cover a range of interesting and challenging concepts.

All of these major works require students to be independent learners who manage time efficiently. Congratulations to all for the diligence and enormous effort which is required to complete such projects. A special recognition goes to the Muirfield High School staff, who have supported our students through their projects, providing them with guidance, advice and expertise along the way.



## Year 11

Students have now completed over 80% of their Preliminary Courses. Year 11 exams will commence in Week 9 of this term. It is important in leading up to the exams that students implement a structured study routine in order to give them the opportunity to perform at their best.

This should not preoccupy student thinking at this time as no consideration will be given to subject discontinuation until Week 5 Term 4. 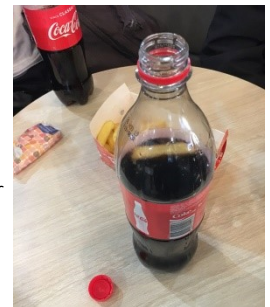
### What Did I have For Breakfast?

However, I have some concern over the food choices that some students make. I have taken a couple of snap shots of some of this food. Some students even state that this is their breakfast and that they are stocking up to eat throughout the day.

### Limit intake of foods containing added Sugars

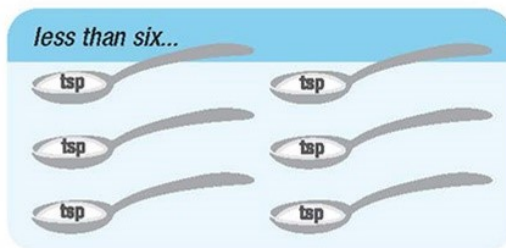
Excessive consumption of foods containing added sugars can contribute to multiple health problems including obesity and tooth decay. The Australian Dietary Guidelines recommend limiting the intake of foods that have added sugars such as jams, confectionery, biscuits, cakes, ice cream, and syrups; as well as drinks such as soft drinks, energy drinks, cordials, fruit drinks, flavoured waters or sports drinks.

These foods are classified as 'discretionary choices'. It is recommended that adolescents have no more than 0-2 ½ serves of these foods a day.

Students:

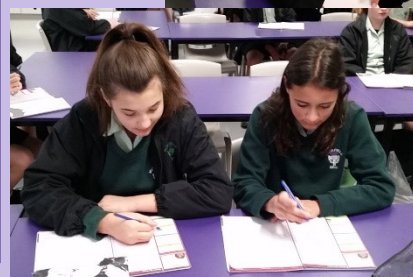

Roll call teachers monitor the use of the diaries and help to facilitate students' understanding of the core values, and how to best practise these in their schooling and beyond.

Parents:

Parents can support and encourage their child by regularly checking the school diary.

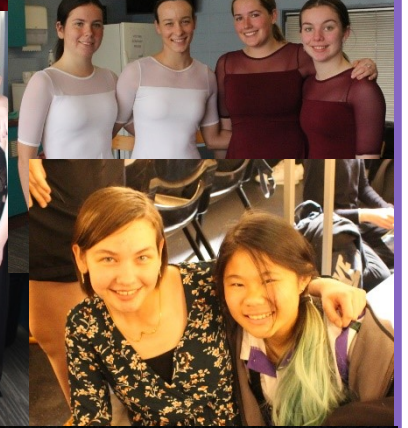

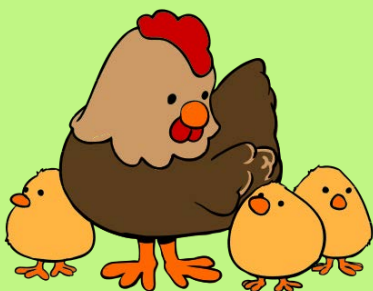
## Meet Dennis

## **Year 9 & 10 Commerce Excursion - NSW Parliament House and the Justice and Police Museum**

Commerce students from Years 9 and 10 went on an excursion to NSW Parliament House and the Justice and Police Museum as part of their study of the topics 'Political Involvement' and 'Law and Society'.

At NSW Parliament students were welcomed by Baulkham Hills MP (Muirfield local member) and Minister for Police and Emergency Services the Hon. David Elliot MP. Students were able to go into both the Legislative Assembly and Legislative Council chambers, hear how both chambers work in the process of passing legislation and then participate in a mock parliament role play.



On the excursion Muirfield students also visited the Justice and Police Museum, which is a heritage-listed former water police station, offices and courthouse and now justice and police museum located in the Sydney central business district.

Students participated in the 'trial run' program, which provided them with the opportunity to develop a deeper understanding of the interrelationships between the law and society. Selected museum collection items were used to explain how the laws that govern society are developed, implemented and enforced.

Students looked at evidence that highlights how laws have evolved to reflect changing societal values and consider what it would have been like awaiting trial in the holding cells. They also studied the symbolism of the courtroom and learnt about the traditions and structure of the NSW legal system. A highlight of the program was the mock trial during which students assumed the roles of various court officials to work through the processes and etiquette of a Local Court hearing.





## **The Voice of Youth Public Speaking Competition - Hosted by The Lions Club of Carlingford-Dundas**

Two of our Year 8 students, Lucas Albarracin and Sophie Balada-Gray, courageously participated in the Lions Club of Carlingford-Dundas's 'The Voice of Youth Public Speaking Competition' held at Tara Anglican School for Girls.

The first component of the competition required students to study a range of topics from which they would be given an impromptu question, and then had to answer in a speech of 1-2 minutes. Topics included:

- Our national flag and its design
- Space exploration and what we have learned
- Learn-to-swim classes at school
- Daylight Saving

The second component was a prepared speech where students could prepare a speech of 3-4 minutes on one of the following topics:

- Video surveillance in public places
- Equal pay for male and female athletes in same sport?
- More wind farms or more dams?
- Uluru - to climb or not to climb?
- Important stages in Australian history
- Childhood Immunisations and Vaccinations

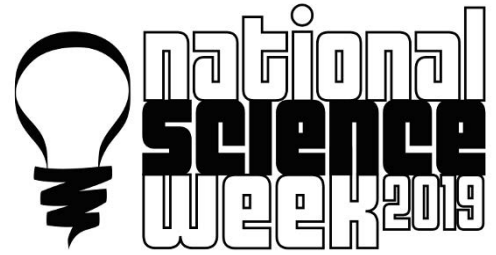
Both students performed brilliantly in what was a very challenging activity with a strong field of competitors. Lucas was awarded runner up, which was an outstanding effort!

## Science Week - Destination Moon

National Science Week this year was held from Monday 12<sup>th</sup> August to Friday 16<sup>th</sup> August. This year's theme, 'Destination Moon' encouraged students and teachers to investigate how science, technology, engineering and mathematics have been used to solve real world problems in space travel.



Year 7 engaged in a space lander STEM challenge where teams of students competed to see who could design the most effective and resource-efficient landing vehicle that preserved the integrity of their fragile cargo – an egg! Students brainstormed possible design choices and collaboratively decided on a design that fit within the regulations.

Opportunities for multiple test-drops accompanied the extensive revision process as students worked together to improve their design. The enthusiasm, willingness to take on a challenge and creativity the students showed was infectious and their final egg-drop devices reflected their collective efforts.



The Year 11 Physics class worked with the Year 7 classes to design and build their space lander and cheered them on during the testing. The Physics class also had the privilege of witnessing the very first model rocket ever to be launched on school grounds. This was a very exciting opportunity for these students.

Well done to Year 7 and Year 11 Physics and thanks to the Science faculty for their support in creating this opportunity.

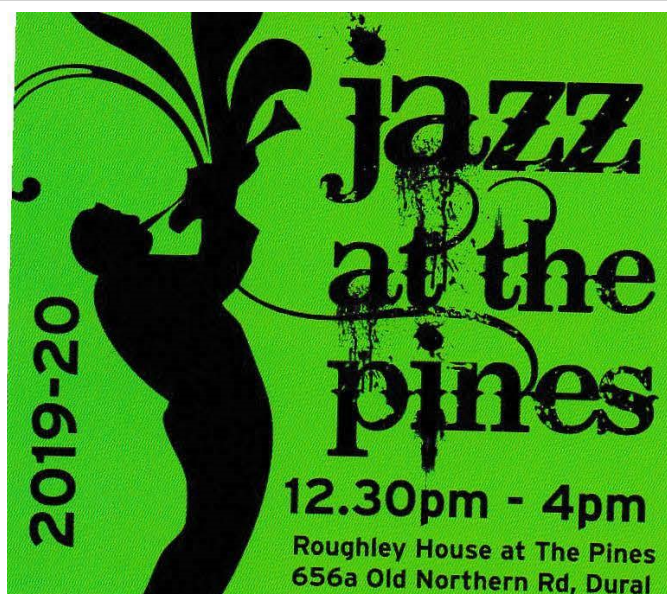

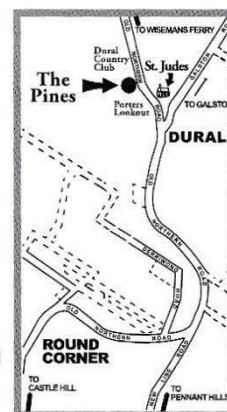

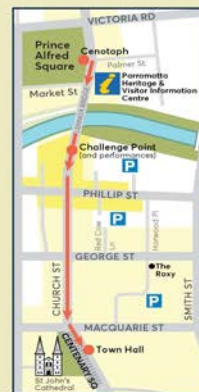
