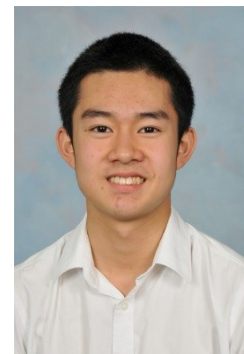

Uniform reminder for 2022

The P&C and the wider Muirfield community strongly support the wearing of the school uniform; hence the uniform shop is totally managed by the P&C.

Before parents purchase any uniform items, I urge parents to use the uniform shop to ensure that the purchased items will definitely be approved by the school.

The Department of Education has very clear guidelines on what is appropriate footwear. To help parents avoid any confusion, I have included visuals of what is approved footwear on page 8 of this newsletter.

To further help parents, information about uniform and footwear is also available on the school website.

Please support the school when purchasing uniform for 2022 so that students avoid getting into unnecessary trouble next year. The most common items that our students wear that are NOT uniform include:

- branded running shorts, instead of designated school sport shorts
- sports shorts and track pants on non-sport days
- non-school tracksuit pants (branded and non-branded)
- non-leather shoes
- black elasticised tights/active wear for girls



Please note that breaches of school uniform are reported on all school reports from Year 7 -12.

Thank you to the vast majority of families and students that help us in maintaining our positive public image and strong school spirit that wearing correct uniform engenders. Your cooperation in this important matter is appreciated.

	<p>Unacceptable Boys Shoes: Features:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Splashes of colour/white (shoes must be totally black, inc. shoelaces and sole) - Canvas upper Eg Vans or Rabens
	<p>Acceptable Girl's Shoes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Leather upper providing protection to the majority of the upper foot - Laced (preferred) or leather strapped* - Heal and sole with non-slip grip
	<p>Unacceptable Girl's Shoes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The majority of the upper foot is unprotected. - Smooth sole with little grip - No/token heel - Thin/soft leather offering little protection.
<p>Sports Shoes</p>	<p>Acceptable Sports Shoes</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Lace up/Velcro (no slip ons) - Covers all of the top of the foot - Provides arch support and sole protection

Socra-Tick with 9B

Having commenced studying the form and purpose of documentaries with Ms. Chen, our University of Sydney Intern, the analytical skills of 9B English class were put to the test when they entered the rigorously intellectual fray of a Socratic Seminar.

"Socratic what?" you ask.

A Socratic Seminar involves small groups of students interrogating an idea under timed conditions before asking open-ended questions of their peers and justifying their own ideas when questioned.



According to Celine Tran from 9B, "The Socratic Seminar required me to provide reasoning and evidence, based on the documentary that we were studying." That said, the real-world skill of justifying your own ideas in the company of and under the interrogation of your peers can be daunting.

Being daunted, however, is not something this class shies away from. Even though Eden Eshed admitted that she, "went into the task confused and a little nervous," Eden discovered that as soon as the class, "got the hang of it, our confidence began to grow and the seminar became informative and exciting.



" She wasn't alone in this impression. Another student admitted, "At the start of the task, I was worried that it would be an awkward experience and ... worried we would all answer the same. However, by the end, it was a satisfying lesson and I felt as though I had learned more about the documentary. I think everyone's ideas were incredible and that the discussion points were well constructed." (Ella Read)

Facilitating a learning experience where students recognise the value of civil discourse that encourages them, "to engage with other students, whom [they] don't really talk to," (Jonah Mariano)

and, "to think quickly on your feet so that you can combat any questions," (Ashleigh Holman) is incredibly rewarding for all involved.

Eden Eshed effectively sums up the value of this learning strategy, "I think a Socratic seminar is a great learning device as it taught me to see things from different perspectives and allowed me to share my own as well."

In a world where the art of civil discourse and logical argument seems all but lost, Socrates' method of learning gets a big tick with 9B.

School Travel for 2022



2022 school travel applications are now open

Students who need a School Opal card or travel pass for 2022 can [apply](#) now. A new application will need to be submitted if they are applying for a school travel pass for the first time, or if they are requesting an additional travel entitlement as a result of a new shared parental responsibility situation (e.g. joint custody).

Students who change address, school, campus location, or who have repeated a year or received an expiry notification from Transport for NSW for their school travel entitlement should [renew or update](#) their details before **the end of term 4**. This will ensure that schools can endorse applications and current entitlements are updated and remain valid. School Opal card holders will have the changes applied to their existing card.

If a student's distance eligibility has changed based on their grade the system will automatically update their entitlement if they meet the new criteria. If they do not meet the new [eligibility criteria](#), they will receive an expiry notification via email.

Students who have an entitlement approved under a medical condition that is due to expire will receive a notification advising them to re-apply.

[Term Bus Pass](#) holders will receive a notification to re-apply.

Students in the Opal network applying for an Opal card (including a Term Bus Pass) for the first time will receive their Student Opal card at their nominated postal address. Cards will be mailed out from January 2022.

Students living in rural and regional (R&R) areas should receive their travel pass at the start of the new school year from their nominated transport operator. It may come via the school or be sent directly to them at home. **Note:** some R&R operators do not issue travel passes. Students/parents should confirm with their nominated operator if they do not receive a pass.

School Student Transport Scheme site change

On 1 October 2021 the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) information and application portal was moved to transportnsw.info. This will assist families to find all their travel information in the one place.

Travel from Term 1 2022

We ask that parents plan ahead and make sure their child knows which service/s to use and has a valid ticket to travel; either a School Opal card or Child/Youth Opal card (within Greater Sydney) or a School Travel Pass (outside Greater Sydney), from the start of the school year.

Applications for the School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) open at the start of Term 4 2021 for travel in 2022, so parents/students can [apply](#) or [update](#) details early and be ready for the start of the new school year.

Most students using the Opal network will not need a new Opal card and can continue travelling on their existing card each year.

The start of the year is a difficult period for local bus operators, and students travelling without a valid ticket make service planning and operations increasingly difficult.

We recognise that for some families last minute changes to school enrolments mean they may not have a School Opal card or Travel Pass for the start of term. In the Opal network, we strongly encourage these families to have their children travel on a Child/Youth Opal card until they receive their valid School Opal card. If outside Greater Sydney, parents should contact their [local bus operator](#) to discuss their travel needs.

Bus operators are flexible and understanding, particularly at the start of the school year, and will ensure students can travel safely to and from school. But to best support our operators we encourage all students to have a valid ticket, as early as possible, from the start of the school year.

Please also remember that students using Opal cards must tap on and tap off in line with the [Student code of conduct](#) and [Opal terms of use](#).

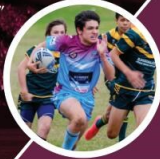
