#### **Muirfield Farewells "The History Hut"**



In 1978, a group of students, teachers and parents from Muirfield undertook a real-life building project – they moved a dilapidated hut from the Windsor district to the school site.

Below you can see photos of the hut in its original home and plans

drawn by students for its rebuild.

Original ideas for its use included turning it into a museum but it has largely sat empty as its size and construction limit its use as a school facility. (Not totally empty. There is a story that a young



student ran away from home and lived in the hut, undetected, for a number of weeks, until a neighbour reported the smoke coming from the chimney one night.)

Time and termites have had an impact on the original outer sheeting and some of the modern pine support beams. The hut was

assessed as unsafe earlier in 2021 by the Department of Education building assessors.

In the 1980s schools were not restricted by so many regulations. But it has never been considered part of the

school buildings by the Department – understandable as it was a student project, not a designated building.

For 43 years it has sat in the middle of the school car park, adding to the bucolic vista with the farm and grazing sheep in the background. I know I will miss the daily view of the hut and farm – a bit of rural landscape in the suburbs.

Coincidences happen in life. A current history teacher, Ms Maxwell, has family links to the hut. The hut was originally built by the great-greatgrandfather of Ms Maxwell's husband. He was an early farmer in the Windsor district.

While the physical hut will no longer exist, memories, photos and family connections will continue.

#### Year 7 – 11 Reports

Years 8, 10 and 11 reports are now available on the Sentral parent portal, whilst reports for Years 7 and 9 are in the final phase of editing before they will be available before the end of term.

#### Year 11 2022 Information Evening and Subject Samplers

On Monday 19 July we will be holding our Year 11 2022 Information Evening in the school hall. Information about the requirements of subject choice and the procedures students need to follow will be discussed. All parents, carers and students of Year 10 2020 are invited and highly encouraged to attend.

The evening will focus on:

- Higher School Certificate requirements
- MHS curriculum structure for the senior years
- the Higher School Certificate subjects on offer
- the rules covering patterns of study to be eligible for the HSC
- how the Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is calculated
- the HSC Minimum Standards
- the Year 11 Subject Information Booklet
- the Year 11 subject selection process
- TVET and TAFE courses on offer
- Pathways to the HSC

Subject Selection Samplers will take place during Week 3, where faculty representatives, will deliver a series of talks to Year 10 about subjects offered in their respective faculty.

Students should use this time to gather information about different subjects (some of which you may know very little about!), listen carefully to advice and ask questions, before having to make their final selections by Monday morning of Week 4.

In Week 4, students and their parents will be invited to attend an extensive subject selection interview via Zoom with an Executive Teacher, Year Adviser or Careers Adviser.

During the meeting, the conversation will cover issues such as whether NESA requirements have been met, and that subjects have been chosen in

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consideration of their ability and future aspirations, among other issues. In past years, we have found this to be an effective process for helping students and provide detailed advice.

This meeting will work best if Parents attend to support their child in this important decision-making process.

#### Year 9 2022 Subject Selections

Year 8 will also be making their subject selections for 2022 early in Term 3.

This will be the first time that Year 8 have the opportunity to select three subjects that will contribute towards their RoSA.

Due to difficulties in physical distancing, this year we will deliver information to parents and students via our school website.

This will include NESA rules and procedures for Stage 5, school expectations and subject information, so that students are able to make well-informed choices regarding their pattern of study for the next two years. Students will also be addressed in Year meeting. If parents have specific questions, we encourage them to telephone the school.





## **Blanket and Beanie Appeal**

#### **Getting Started is Easy**

Step 1 Download Qkrl

Download the Qkr! app to your phone or tablet device (App Store or Play Store)

#### Step 2 Register

Follow the prompts and select Australia. Set up your name and a password. Add your credit card details. Find Muirfield High School. Add the names of your children.

#### Step 3 Start shopping

Choose the next Monday delivery. Select the items you want, add to Cart, then Checkout when you are finished. You can view and print a receipt (or email it) if required.

#### Step 4 Collect purchase

Students pick up their uniform items during Monday lunchtime opening 12:30 – 1:30pm. (Orders to be placed by Sunday midnight for following Monday pick up)
