Recently Year 7 and 9 students sat their NAPLAN tests online.

The students need to be congratulated on the focus they displayed during the NAPLAN tests. Some students can find these external, and sometimes internal, tests quite distressing while others take it in their stride. Remember, the tests are purely diagnostic and designed to help the school determine areas to improve student literacy and numeracy outcomes. They do not in any way reflect the total ability level of an individual candidate.

I would like to thank Ms James and Mr Trewin for ensuring that the days ran



smoothly and as stress free as possible for the students. A big thank you to our five School Learning Support Officers for the support they gave to our students during NAPLAN. There were ongoing, statewide connectivity issues that Muirfield could not control. NESA has publicly said they are working on fixing these issues. Unfortunately, this is the third year our students have undertaken NAPLAN online each year many of our students faced interruptions to their tests. That they persevered is to their credit.

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Stage 6 Senior Review

Ensuring that we appropriately support students in their Stage 6 pattern of study is a priority for the teachers of Muirfield High School. One way that this is achieved is though the system of Senior Reviews.

Students who are not meeting course requirements across a number of subjects are invited to the review meeting with their parents. The review team compromises the Deputy Principal, Careers Adviser and the Senior Review Co-ordinator. Issues and positive solutions are discussed and a learning contract is agreed on with the relevant student. This may provide goals and advice such as how to catch up on outstanding course work, what available school supports the student can access, establishing study plans or establishing timelines for overdue assessment tasks.

Next term the review team will convene again to follow up with students.

Senior study can be a challenging but a very rewarding part of a students overall education. The Senior Reviews are a means in which we can build and refine the independent leaning skills necessary for success in the HSC.

I would like to thank our Head Teacher Senior Studies Ms Ansoul and Ms Pasternesky for taking the time and effort to assist students in this manner.

Year 7-12 Semester 1 Reports

Term 2 is a busy time as all the teaching staff complete Semester 1 reports. Year 12 students will receive a printed report from Ms Reeves who meets individually with the students. This provides the Principal with the opportunity to congratulate and counsel students on their current progress. This personal touch is always well received by the students who appreciate the genuine interest that Ms Reeves shows in their education.

All other reports will be published to the parent portal as they are finalised. The usual email notification will be sent prior to them appearing.

Learning Outside the Classroom

In this newsletter, you will find reports, written by students, about recent activities, that have taken their learning beyond the classroom. This newsletter also contains information about the upcoming CAPA/LOTE Workshop Week. I thank the teachers who organise these activities. These learning opportunities are not only fun, they help students link their learning to the world beyond school, give purpose and meaning to what is studied and challenge and extend students.

School Uniform

Winter has finally arrived and with the cooler weather comes the increase in students layering of clothing in order to remain warm.

Unfortunately, there has been an increasing number of students who wish to counter the school uniform policy by wearing casual tracksuit pants and 'hoodies'. It is important to remember that the wearing of 'hoodies' underneath their jackets is not acceptable. The wearing of these non-uniform items will likely result in a detention and noted on the student's school report. There are numerous other alternatives to use as extra layers. School uniform tracksuit pants are only permitted on Wednesday. On all occasions students should be in school pants, not tracksuit pants. Years 7 and 12 students wear school uniform all week. The correct school pants are available at the uniform shop.

If you are having difficulties in meeting the school's uniform expectations please contact your relevant Deputy Principal and discuss your situation. The school is willing to support families who need assistance.

For your information the school's Uniform Policy is available on the school website. The school and its community appreciate your support in maintaining our positive public image and strong school spirit that wearing correct uniform engenders.

E-cigarettes and Vaping

Nicotine vaping has become a major issue for our society. Part of this problem has been how easy they are to obtain via the internet and retailers. The selling of these vapes to children under the age of 18 is illegal. Please see below an excerpt from the Department of Health's website, explaining how to report retailers who are breaking the law:

Reporting retailers of illegal nicotine e-cigarettes

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes are battery operated devices which heat a liquid (or e-liquid) to produce a vapour to inhale. Using an ecigarette is sometimes called 'vaping'.

E-cigarettes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens or USB memory sticks. E-liquid contains a range of chemicals or flavours and often contains nicotine.

In NSW, the sale of e-cigarettes and e-liquids which contain nicotine is illegal. Selling tobacco or e-cigarettes to minors is also illegal. NSW Health is seeing an increase in the sale of nicotine containing e-cigarettes, including to minors.

NSW Health takes non-compliance with tobacco and e-cigarette laws seriously and NSW Health Officers undertake inspections of retailers to ensure they are complying with the laws.

If you think a retail store is selling e-cigarettes which contain nicotine or selling any tobacco or e-cigarette products to minors, please report it to NSW Health by completing the online reporting form <u>https://</u> <u>www.health.nsw.gov.au/tobacco/Pages/let-us-know-reports-</u> <u>complaints.aspx</u>

or by calling the Tobacco Information Line on 1800 357 412.

Knives

The Department of Education has a paramount duty to ensure the safety and well-being of students and staff in attendance at its schools. You have a right to expect, when sending your children to school, that they will be safe.

The Department has updated its advice around bringing knives to school. From Wednesday 19 May 2021, and until further notice, no students may carry a knife while at school, even those worn for genuine religious reasons. We request that parents and carers talk with their children to make sure they understand this change. Knives carried for religious purposes, including kirpans, will need to be kept at home for the foreseeable future.

On a wet and windy Wednesday during Week 3, Mr Edmondstone led his students off to the Great Aussie Bush Camp at Kincumber. Although exhausted on their return and in need of some drying out, the students reflected that they found the experience both rewarding and challenging.

Students participated in numerous activities and seminars over the three-day camp. In groups, they completed a number of challenges unique to outdoor learning



centres. Students were challenged to step out of their comfort zone and try activities that tested their limits such as the power fan leap, abseiling, commando, survivor challenge, giant swing and the high ropes. They also completed sessions addressing the mandatory Life Ready course, designed to prepare and support senior students as they encounter situations related to health and safety as they become more independent and gain more responsibilities. All the activities are designed to develop positive relationships, fostering the right kind of attitudes about themselves while learning about safe risk taking in a supportive environment.



Students returned very tired with remnants of mud still behind their ears and a bag full of drenched clothes but clearly had a terrific couple of days away. I am sure that they will share these experiences with each other for many years to come. All of the staff who attended — Mr Edmondstone, Ms Wong, Ms Millett, Mr Kent, Mr Skevington and Stu — were very impressed with the behaviour of all the students. The Aussie Bush Camp leaders repeatedly told us how impressed they were with the Year 11's behaviour and attitude, one of whom said she had already requested to be on duty the next time Muirfield was due to come.

Year 12 Agriculture had the opportunity to relate our studies and apply our knowledge in an industry-based atmosphere by interacting with the people who specialise in specific areas (such as beekeepers) and by applying knowledge from our "studies. Information presented by Landcare (an organisation which




addresses and acts on local natural resource management) reinforced our "Soils and Sustainability" topic, and we were able to receive a further insight to the organisation. We also had the chance to see emerging technologies in action, such as drones and SwagBot (a robot that promotes precision farming); topics which will be studies in our module, "Farming in the 21st Century".

Having the opportunity to see emerged/emerging technologies like drones, DrumMuster (environmentally friendly way of disposing empty farming chemical containers), an industry size cattle crush, SwagBot, Flexibladder (to assist in effluent management) and so much more, has provided Year 12 Agriculture with an industry-based perception to certain technologies, in a practical approach.


