TERM 1 – Australian Rock

Australian Rock

This first unit of study encompasses the birth and development of the Australian Rock scene. Political, geographical, cultural and artistic factors are considered when discussing the repertoire, with the aim to connect the music directly to the historical climate of the 1900's. Students take ownership of their learning through the completion of a summative assessment task, which involves selecting an Australian rock artist to conduct further research on. Afterwards, students form groups and select their own roles for a final end of term performance of an Australian Rock piece. Student's are refreshed on their knowledge of the 6 musical concepts, as these are used to analyse iconic songs from the genre.

TERM 2 – Digital Music Production

TIMING Weeks: 10	<p>Digital Music This unit explores the manners in which computers and technology have been utilised to create music. Students acquire, develop then apply new skills in order to produce their own electronic music. Students learn to utilise a variety of tools such as DAWs, online sequencers, MIDI editors, and music production games. The Concepts of music are explained further and utilised to analyse pieces from various digital music genres.</p>

TERM 3 – Jazz Introduction

TIMING Weeks: 10	<p>Cool Jazz Basics of Jazz such as blues and gospel are revised for the students to build an understanding of the subsequent sub-genres. Brief social and historical context is set which introduces students to the North American lifestyle and music of the early 20th Century. The unit then quickly progresses to Cool Jazz and the use of modes for both composition, and improvisation. Students then research and develop their improvisation skills, before learning to play a few simple Jazz pieces.</p>

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TERM 4 – Piano / Keyboard - Level 2

TIMING Weeks: 11	<p>Piano Studies Students are shown how to utilise the keyboard in creative ways, especially for composition. Students revise their keyboard studies from the previous year, then use this foundation to learn some advanced principles of the instrument. Various creative resources and activities are utilised for the students to experience a holistic view of the instrument. The final yearly music examination summarises the student’s knowledge of all theoretical components covered throughout the year, with a view to preparing them for the Stage 5 Elective music course.</p>
