Relocation Scholarship for the Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies

Value: \$3,000 - \$5,000

The Institute for Marine and Antarctic Studies (IMAS) is a centre of excellence for both research and education. IMAS' research is innovative, relevant and globally distinctive. IMAS delivers first-class programs resulting in highly trained scientists and researchers serving the needs of academic institutions, industry, government and the community. These generous scholarships are offered by IMAS to encourage high achieving students relocating from interstate, or Tasmanian students who are required to move away from home, to study at IMAS and to assist with relocation expenses.

Available to domestic students relocating from interstate, or Tasmanian students (i.e. students with a permanent residential address in Tasmania at the time of application), who are required to relocate to either Hobart or Launceston to study, and who are commencing their first year of study (year 1) in either Semester 1 or Semester 2 2020, for the first time, in the Bachelor of Marine and Antarctic Science (P3L). Students must have achieved an Australian Tertiary Admission Ranking (ATAR) of 85 or above, OP8 or above, or IB30 or above in 2019. The bursary will commence in the first semester of study.

Final year teacher education students, get paid in your last semester of study to become a teacher of a <u>high-demand subject area</u>. Up to 40 Incentive Scholarships are available to future teachers of <u>mathematics</u>, <u>science (with physics)</u>, selected <u>Technological and Applied Studies (TAS)</u> subjects and <u>special education (K-12)</u>.

To apply, you will need to:

- 1. be an Australian citizen or permanent resident.
- 2. be currently completing your final year of initial teacher education studies at a recognised Australian university or tertiary institution.
- 3. study in a subject area of need.
- 4. not already hold a <u>Teacher Education Scholarship</u>, teach.*Rural* Scholarship or Great Teaching, Inspired Learning Internship.
- 5. have submitted an application to teach in NSW public schools through the department's <u>approval to teach</u>.
- 6. be willing to accept appointment as a permanent full time teacher to a NSW public school in an agreed location on completion of your studies for a minimum period of three consecutive years.
- 7. if you have not completed the full four years of required higher education in a country where English is the main language, be able to demonstrate that your English language proficiency is of a standard which would enable you to teach and interact effectively and confidently in a NSW school. You will be required to undertake an assessment of your English language proficiency this is a requirement to gain an approval to teach in NSW public schools.

Ready to leave school?

If you're about to leave school and begin the next chapter of life, it can be exciting and of course – a little bit daunting.

Here's our top things to consider, if you haven't already.

Money:

Whether you plan to start working straight away, get an apprenticeship or traineeship, or plan to do further study and work part time, there's a few things you'll need to sort out: Think about how you want to <u>manage your money</u>. For example:

• Decide where you want to bank and set up an account.

(If you already have a bank account set up then you could make an appointment to chat with your bank and see if they have anything that could suit you better). Or shop around and see what other banks are offering.

- The best way to access your money credit cards can get really expensive, leaving you with lots of debt if you don't pay them off quickly.
- In addition to your super it's great to have a savings account where you can put money out of temptations way while you save up for a trip, car, house deposit or whatever else you're planning.
- Planning and sticking to a budget. Sounds boring, right? But not nearly as boring as running out of money before payday and watching all your mates go out and have fun, when you can't even afford more than 2 minute noodles for tea. You can always allocate some "fun money" for those days when you do want to splurge a little.
- Check you're being paid and taxed correctly.

Learn about <u>**Tax**</u> and find out how to <u>apply for a Tax File Number (TFN)</u>. You don't want to find yourself in debt or in trouble with the ATO.

Retirement may seem like a really, really long time away – and you're probably right. But it's still really important that you <u>learn about superannuation</u>, find a great super fund that's right for you, and get yourself set up.

If you'd like to go on to study further, see what <u>scholarships</u> are available and apply for them. If you'd like to go to uni, then find out what <u>finance options</u> you have.

Further Study:

If you don't really want to dive headfirst into work and you're really keen to continue studying, there are lots of options out there for you.

- Find out all about studying at <u>Uni</u> or <u>TAFE</u> and how to apply. If you're keen to start travelling but you'd also like to study, you could investigate your <u>overseas study</u> options. Remember to get your applications in on time and supply all the supporting documentation required.
- Learn about what <u>Apprenticeships or Traineeships</u> have to offer, and if that's an option you'd like to pursue.
- If you're planning to study further, find out if you'll need to get a <u>Unique Student</u> <u>Identifier</u> (USI) and <u>create</u> one if you'll need it.

Maybe you know what you'd like to do, but you haven't got the foundations (skills, results or education) you'll need. Bear in mind there are always alternative pathways open to you and start finding out how you can achieve your goals.

Accommodation:

If you'll be moving out of home, for work or study, then you'll need to find accommodation options that are within your budget.

Take care that as well as meeting your budget, the location and any other requirements are also met. It could drive you nuts if you find a super cheap apartment, but it takes you 2 hours to get to work or uni. Not to mention it'll cost you more in travel expenses.

- Contact all the utilities companies and arrange to have bills placed in your name, so you don't find yourself without electricity, internet, gas etc.
- Remember to notify organisations about your change of address, e.g. bank, license, employer, super, ATO.
- You might also want to look at insurance for the contents of your new home.

Other things you might need to do:

Write a great resume. We've got some useful hints and tips on our <u>page</u>. Get your own <u>Medicare card</u>. You can apply for your own when you're 15. Set up your <u>Centrelink account</u> and access it online at <u>myGov</u> or through the <u>app</u> – you may have to visit an office to obtain your <u>Customer Reference Number (CRN</u>), if your parents aren't able to tell you what it is.

Register on the <u>electoral roll</u> and remember to update your address when or if you move.

Once you've checked everything off your list, you can relax and get to enjoying life after school.

Job Spotlight

Civil Engineering

Civil Engineers and Drafts people help create the spaces where people live, move, and work. They design, build, operate and maintain all sorts of structures, including roads, ports, railways, mines, dams, structures and more.

What type of person would this job suit?

- You need to be creative, with an eye for design and strong attention to detail
- Strong maths skills, and a love of making things line up
- You should be **self-reliant**, and able to manage multiple projects at once
- Good organisational habits
- Ability to work well in a team, as engineering projects are always team-based

Industries where you find civil engineers:

- Technology

- Transport

Pathways

If you've got a passion for any of these industries and you think you've got the necessary attributes, then you have some choices.

You can choose to head to university and gain a degree, which will make you competitive for the Professional roles. There are also lots of cadetships and paid internships on offer for engineering students, which could help pay for your degree and provide a salary plus work experience.

Study <u>Civil Engineering at UNSW</u> and graduate with honours (GE rank for 2020: 93) The <u>3 + 2 Engineering Pathway from UWA</u> is a good example of a comprehensive course that would give you all the qualifications you need (and then some).

Alternatively, you can start out at TAFE and gain a Cert III or IV, then work and gain experience before deciding if you want to go to uni later on.

The <u>Cert III in Manufacturing Technology</u> from TAFE Queensland is a good example of an introductory course that could get you started. You can even study online.

Levels

Engineering Draftspersons and Technicians

Most jobs require a Cert III or IV

Draftspersons and Technicians assist Civil Engineers by preparing sketches, taking samples, assisting on site, estimating material costs, inspecting works and organising construction. You will usually be working alongside and possibly under the supervision of a degree qualified engineer.

You could expect to earn over \$80,000 per year at this level (but we've seen jobs offering well over \$100,000 for experienced drafters)

Civil Engineering Professionals

Minimum requirement: Bachelor Degree

You could be responsible for preparing a site for a build, including taking rock and soil samples, determining safe loads and adjusting design to suit conditions, or you could design structures from bridges to shopping centres, airports to schools, to make sure they can stand up to the elements and remain safe for everyone.

At this level you could expect to earn over \$100,000 per year.
